Re: Petition for Contract Approval by Township of East Brunswick under New Jersey Water Supply Public-Private Contracting Act. N.J.S.A. 58:26-19 et. seq.

To the Honorable Board of Public Utilities:

The Township of East Brunswick is a Municipal Corporation within the County of Middlesex One operating Division is the East Brunswick self-liquidating Water Utility, which provides water service to East Brunswick and bulk sales of water to Spotswood, South River and Helmetta. The Township is seeking approval of a Public Private Contract between the Township of East Brunswick and Utility Service Group similar to the approval recently granted under BPU Docket #WO15050548 to the Township of Mahwah.

The Township of East Brunswick has three storage vessels (a.k.a. tanks) two are elevated tanks, which are hydropillar facilities, hosting three million gallons of water in the air to provide head pressure and a ten million gallon ground level reservoir. These three storage vessels service the critical needs during the max days and max hours and/or any kind of interruption in the water supply. These water vessels in the future shall be referred to as "tanks" and are currently in need of repair currently and continuously in order to provide high quality storage of water to protect the investments the Township has made in the tanks. We have negotiated a Contract with Utility Service Group (a copy attached), which provides for GASB 34 Compliance in order to have the tanks fully restored in a planned approach, maintained at zero depreciation for the next forty (40) years. This Contract is designed to protect the tax payers and Water Utility Customers investment which they have placed into the tank system.

Under the Public Private Contracting Provisions of New Jersey said Contract is subject to review, modification, comment and approval by the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities, Department of Environmental Protection and New Jersey Department of Community Affairs. Separate letters are sent to each of the three State Agencies and this letter along with the filing fee of \$25 and the ten original copies is the first step for your review.

We understand you are familiar with the firm called Utility Service Group (USG) and they have supplied to the Board, under a prior Docket, their Audit, Financial Performa and information which would permit you to feel confident they are both capable to perform the tasks, as well as reliable for future compliance with the contract. The Township is not relying solely on the reputation or the financial reports of USG; however, we are requiring insurance guarantees to be filed with the Township as part of the Contract to ensure compliance in full with the Public Private Tank Asset Management Program.

As the Board reviews the Contract, I believe it is important for you to understand the Water Utility of East Brunswick and the impact of this Contract may have on the rate payers within our Township and the adjoining communities. It is the Utility's policies to fund all improvements through short-term Notes and Retire the Notes in accordance with the limited statutory provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:2-A. Therefore, the Township has replaced all the old 1950 lines. The Township has good working equipment, it is fully funded and there are no open obligations. The painting and maintenance of the tanks is a cost which will be funded and paid for with short-term obligations and will not result in bonding or burdensome cost on Water Utility. The Water Utility has operated with a positive Fund Balance for years and attached is a copy of our POS, which is used for financing in the capital market. I particularly draw your attention to page 14 and 15. which summarizes the Utility Budget and the Fund Balance of the Operating Utility. Also the Comparative Balance Sheets are found on Section A of the Official Statement. The signing of a Contract with USG by the Township through the Water Utility will have minimal or marginal impact on the rate structure of the Township. The Township's tariff for water is among the lowest in the State while quality and reliability are among the highest in the State for we have maintained the system in excellent operating condition.

The proposed Contract is for a period of 40 years; however, the governing body does have the option to terminate the Contract at any time by exercising the "Notice to Terminate". Also the Contract provides for full insurance in accordance with the RFP, which was developed and the Township will be fully protected. The tanks will be in full compliance with the "A.W.W.A Specifications" and we will implement GASB 34 for zero depreciation.

On Page 3 of 7 of the Contract is the proposed payment schedule, as each of the three tanks will be restored at a different time. The Fern Road tank needs work immediately and I am asking The Board to review our Contract in an expeditious manner in order to permit us to comply with the September, October time frame when we would take the Fern Road tank off line. It could be painted at the end of summer and prior to commencement of colder winter weather.

All the tanks have been tested and there is a small amount of lead in the primer in two of the tanks; however, the lead can be neutralized and will not be considered a hazardous waste in accordance with the EPA standards. Therefore, the painting of the tanks and the Contract Management will not cause extraordinary expenses to be incurred or unforeseen events to result.

I would be pleased to answer any concerns or questions, the Board may have relative to Discovery, as it pertains to this Petition seeking expedited approval of the Contract.

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

RE: Management and Full Service Maintenance Program for Water Storage Vessel (Tanks)

Dear Council President Hughes and Council Members:

This firm is Counsel to the International Union of Painters and Allied Trades District Council 711 ("IUPAT 711") and its members living in East Brunswick and Middlesex County. As you know, IUPAT 711 has expressed concerns on several occasions with the proposed contract with Utility Services Group to manage the Township's Water Storage Vessels ("tanks"). The proposed contract is scheduled for discussion at the Council's August 31, 2015 meeting.

IUPAT 711 continues to have concerns for the proposed contracting for all of the reasons previously noted. As you will recall, IUPAT previously expressed concerns regarding the bidding process and whether there was any input into the drafting of the RFP by any of the bidding companies or whether the RFP was drafted in such a way as to make the "pool of contractors solicited [as] expansive as possible" as called for by the New Jersey Office of the State Comptroller's Best Practices for Awarding Service Contracts. If so, then it fails to "secure for the public the benefits of unfettered competition," which would violate the public bidding laws as upheld by numerous New Jersey courts over several decades.

Additionally, it has come to our attention that the contracting of this matter pursuant to the New Jersey Water Supply Public-Private Contracting Act, ("WSPPCA") N.J.S.A. §§58:26-

19, et seq., instead of through the traditional procedures of New Jersey's Local Public Contract Law ("LPCL"), N.J.S.A. §§40A:11-5.1, et seq., may be inappropriate.

The WSPPCA requires that any city or other public entity seeking to enter into a contract with a private entity to operate and manage local water services must follow certain procedures and meet certain requirements. N.J.S.A. §§58:26-20 to 22. The Act authorizes local governments to enter into contracts for the operation and maintenance of water supply facilities. N.J.S.A. §58:26-20. Water supply facilities are defined as "the plants, structures, or other real or personal property acquired, constructed or operated, or to be acquired, constructed or operated, by or on behalf of a public entity for the collection, impoundment, storage, improvement, treatment, filtration, conservation, protection, transmission or distribution of water." N.J.S.A. §58:26-21. Thus, a reading of the plain language of the statute makes clear that the "water supply facility" would include all of the plants, structures. Or other real or personal property that goes into the township's water supply system. Carving out a contract to provide services solely to maintain the tanks violates the Legislative intent of the Act.

Thus, IUPAT 711 continues to have serious concerns regarding the process that has been utilized for both drafting the RFP and selecting the winning bidder. On behalf of IUPAT 711, we urge the Council once again to give serious consideration to these concerns and to thoroughly review the process that has been used for awarding this bid.

Thank you for your attention to this matter of significant concern.

1	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: Moving on to
2	C, this can I have a motion for item A, opening
3	the public hearing on a public/private contract with
4	Utility Services Group for tank maintenance in
5	accordance with N.J.S.A. 58:26-23.
6	COUNCILWOMAN CONTRINO: So moved.
7	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: Motion by
8	Councilwoman Contrino
9	COUNCILWOMAN CLARK: Second.
10	COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: second by
11	Councilwoman Clark. I will now open this portion up
12	to the public for anyone wishing to speak.
13	MR. JASINSKI: Good evening. My name is
14	Joe Jasinski. I'm from Utility Service Group. Also
15	in attendance is Marty Mazzella. He's the director
16	of our north region. And I'd like to thank everyone
17	in the council for this opportunity to speak to you
18	tonight. Like to talk about the program, how it
19	will work, and what it will do for East Brunswick,
20	New Jersey.
21	So first of all, Utility Service is very
22	comfortable working with East Brunswick because we
23	have the same visions. We're a long-term asset
24	management minded company, and also, East Brunswick
25	also has a sustainable vision, which makes it easy

to work with. We have created a customized 1 2 comprehensive program for full-service tank asset management, which will extend the lives of these tanks indefinitely. It will shift the risk of maintaining these tanks from you to us so that you 5 can focus on more important things. You're still 6 7 going to operate the tanks, but we're going to simply maintain them. 8

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So how will all this work? Beginning hopefully at the end of this year, we'll start working on the Fern tank, Fern Road tank, which is one of your large water storage vessels, and we're going to restore these tanks to first rate condition. Once we have them in first rate condition, we're going to maintain them in that condition through a series of annual inspections. cleaning, emergency services that we take care of, as well as putting them on a program to manage the coating system so it's always protecting the steel. This will make the life of these tanks indefinite.

And what will this do for the Town of East Brunswick? It's going to have a positive impact overall on the water quality because clean tanks mean clean water, and it's going to maintain compliance with the EPA, the DEP, and New Jersey, and also OSHA, so that you're always going to be in

2 compliance, and we're going to free up your water

3 department staff so they no longer have to worry

4 about the tanks, the maintenance of the tanks. They

5 can focus on more important things. In addition,

6 it's going to increase revenue opportunity for East

7 Brunswick because I understand that you're

8 interested in putting up cellular, and many of the

9 towns like working with us because we act as their

10 middleman. We make sure that the carriers are

11 properly putting their cables and their antennas on

12 the tanks so it doesn't interfere with the operation

13 of the tanks or the maintenance of the tanks.

And finally, we're going to deliver peace of mind. Overall, the foundation of a full-service asset management program will strengthen your infrastructure to help attract and retain businesses and also provide clean, quality water for your townspeople.

I thank you very much.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: Thank you.

22 Anyone else wishing to speak on this particular

23 topic? Seeing none, I will close the public portion

24 here, but the clerk will be holding the record open

25 for 7 days for anyone who is not able to attend who

may wish to make comment. They can call the clerk's office, and they can figure out how to get their written testimony over if they wishing to the township. What's the number to the clerk's office directly?

MS. PERRY: 732-390-6850.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: 6850. Anyone

on council wishing to speak on this? Councilman Spadafino.

MR. SPADAFINO: I just had one question. I think that somebody went over it before, but just one thing about the inspections. Who is going to be inspecting the quality of your work?

COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: Lou, if you want to answer that or --

MR. NEELY: There is a schedule that's been attached to the contract, which you all have, and with that schedule, it shows what inspections and what work is going to be done. Subject to that. they're to issue a report to us every quarter. That report will go to Ed Walker and to George Smith, and I'll probably get a copy of that, also, and we will

23 maintain that they comply with all of the

24 requirements of the contract so that it will now

become contract enforcement, and that will done

through the finance department and through the water 1 2 utility.

MR. SPADAFINO: They will climb on the

4 tank?

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MR. NEELY: If we need be. I've climbed everyone of those tanks a number of times.

MR. SPADAFINO: Well, are you -- but you're not a qualified inspector. You know, is

9 there some qualification for inspection to make sure 10

that it's done appropriately?

MR. NEELY: The primary qualification is going to be that GASB 34 is to hold these tanks in a condition of nondepreciation. Currently, we have a contract with Cathodic Protection Pro, which puts ions in the tanks to keep them from rusting because we don't maintain the tanks by paying them, continuously inspecting them, and keeping the bowls so we're trying to minimize rust between one paint job until the next paint job, which may be 15 or 20 years, and meanwhile, we're having tanks -- once we enter this contract, we're going to stop putting ions in there and having the cathodic protection

22 contract because they are responsible to keep it in 23

24 primary -- in pristine shape every year, and they're

going to do a robotic inspection of that. We'll get

a copy of that robotic inspection on the years we 1 2 don't drain the tank to do a physical inspection. So we'll be looking both at the robotic inspection during when the tank's full and the physical 5 inspection every 4 years when the tank is dropped 6 down so that they can look inside, and if there's 7 any rust or any lack of the epoxy coating that protects the tank, they're going to refurnish that 8 9 at their cost.

So the inspection of it, yes, we're expert enough to know how to tell rust and not see rust and when the tank is not in good shape.

COUNCILWOMAN CONTRINO: Lou, I think the gentleman behind you would like to speak on the

15 issue.

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MR. MAZZELLA: My name is Marty Mazzella. I'm the director of sales for Utility Service Group. So I think your question was during the course of the project when actual work is being done, who ensures the quality of the work. Is that the gist of your question?

MR. SPADAFINO: Yes.

MR. MAZZELLA: Okay. So Utility Service

Group, first of all, we have our own company owned paint groups with a foreman and with a group of --

1 and we're all union crews in New Jersey, but in

2 order to ensure that those crews do quality work, we

3 have inspectors within our organization that are

4 certified by the national association of corrosion

5 engineers at the highest level. There's three

6 levels, level 1, 2, and 3. They're all level 3

7 inspectors. And so the question is often answered

8 - or asked, you know, well, if your inspector is

9 inspecting the work for your own crews, who's really

10 responsible, and the idea behind this whole program

11 is that Utility Service is taking all responsibility

12 and all the risk for the coatings so the

13 responsibility of our inspector is to ensure that

14 the quality of the work being done by our crews will

15 protect the company from having to come back in a

16 short period of time to redo work that's going to

17 cost money out of our pocket because we're not going

18 to collect anymore money from the town. We've set

19 our fee structure up to cover the cost of

20 maintenance over the next several years. So if

21 there's a failure on our part, then we have to

22 absorb that cost. So our inspector's job is to make

23 sure that the crew on site does the work to the

24 standard that's in the specifications so that our

25 risk is mitigated for the future. So in a lot of

9

1 cases, you'll have a third-party inspector

2 inspecting the work of a low-bid contractor, and

3 then there's always this battle between, you know,

4 who's right and who's doing the work. With our

5 group, they work together to make sure the spec is

6 met and that the quality of the work is the highest

7 possible so we don't have to come back out in a

8 number of years and spend hundreds of thousands of

9 dollars to fix a mistake that could have been

avoided with the right inspection and the right

11 work. Does that answer the question? Thank you.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: Councilwoman

**13** Ferraro – Councilwoman Clark.

COUNCILWOMAN CLARK: That's all right.

15 Excuse me. Just to clarify a few things then. Are

16 there state standards for the tanks the way they

17 should be?

MR. MAZZELLA: There are standards set

forth by the American Water Works Association, and

they're pretty much adapted by the state DEP.

COUNCILWOMAN CLARK: Okay. And your quality inspector, your quality control inspectors,

which in effect is what they are, I believe.

MR. MAZZELLA: Yes.

COUNCILWOMAN CLARK: They are certified

1 at the highest level per this --

MR. MAZZELLA: Yes.

COUNCILWOMAN CLARK: -- standard group.

MR. MAZZELLA: Yes.

COUNCILWOMAN CLARK: Okay. So in terms

of self-policing, it's in your best interest then,

of course --

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MR. MAZZELLA: Yes.

9 COUNCILWOMAN CLARK: - by terms of the

10 contract to have that, and if there is a deficiency

11 that either is found, you're responsible for it. If

12 it's something that's overlooked, we do have a

13 standard that we can go to should we need to take

14 action that it will be judged against. Is that

15 correct, as well, Lou, if I'm understanding?

MR. MAZZELLA: There is a --

WITC. WITCHELLT. THOIC IS a

MR. NEELY: The standard for steel tank

**18** maintenance is approved by the American Water Works

19 Association, national standard, and it's approved by

20 the state DEP. We've listed that in the contract.

21 The set of standards that are about 40-page document

22 is attached, and all of those are spelled out, and

23 that was provided copies so that it's on file, and

24 as an appendix to the contract are those standards

that are set by AWWA, and those are to be maintained

and followed. 1 COUNCILWOMAN CLARK: Right. Okay. 2 Thank you for the clarification. 3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: Anyone further? Councilman Wendell. 5 COUNCILMAN WENDELL: I have some 6 questions for Lou actually more about the finance of 7 the -- this contract. This is a 10-year agreement? 8 9 MR. NEELY: No, it's a 40-year agreement. 10 COUNCILMAN WENDELL: Forty-year 11 agreement. 12 13

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MR. NEELY: And any time after the governing body or the mayor may cancel the agreement, but cancelling the agreement would be self-defeating to the whole concept, but it's a 40-year public/private so that those tanks that are our primary head pressure for the system and maintain the pressure in the town, the fire protection, are protected against any corrosion or against any failure.

COUNCILMAN WENDELL: And then we pay monthly, annually?

MR. NEELY: We pay monthly at the end of the month for the services with the exception of

when the tanks are first time fully blasted, cleaned 2 both inside and out, and fully covered. At the end of that contract period, we'll pay for that capital 3 4 improvement, and those are identified, but 5

otherwise, it's a maintenance cost going forward, 6 and then they're responsible for the next 40 years.

7 COUNCILMAN WENDELL: How do we handle 8 repainting the tank in 10, 15, 20 years? MR. NEELY: The contract provides that

9 they will repaint the tank in 15 years at the most, 10

11 and if it needs it prior to that, they'll repaint it, and it's all on their nickel, and it's all part 12

13 of the maintenance fee, and the fee is structured so

that there should be some accretion of value so that 14

at the time they're ready to paint, they have to do 15

16 that. Now, it would be nice to just take them as an

17 article of faith and say, well, we'll trust them, in

18 15 years they'll have money in the left pocket to

pay for the painting of the tank, but sometimes we 19

found that those things fail, and so we're also 20

21 requiring insurance guarantees that will protect the

town so that the town is not only protected with 22

their registration with the state and through the 23

various agencies, but it's also protected with 24

insurance coverage that will cover us from harm. 25

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COUNCILMAN WENDELL: So we're going to pay a lump sum up front that we're going to repaint the tanks.

3 MR. NEELY: We're going to pay for work 4 as it's performed. The Fern Road tank is the tank 5 that needs to be painted first. As that tank is 6 taken out of service, the inside is sand blasted 7 white and then restored with the proper coatings and 8 the proper epoxy and dried, and then the outside. 9 Once that job's completed, we will then pay for that 10 job completed, and that tank will then not have to 11 be ever our nickel again to pay for it. For the 12 next 40 years, they're responsible to take care of 13 it, paint it if it needs, to clean it to any 14 activity that takes place, and to keep it in 15 compliance with OSHA. 16 17

COUNCILMAN WENDELL: So you're familiar -- you've done these tanks a number of times. You're familiar with the costs of refurbishing this tank at this point in time so 20 you're going to negotiate that with these gentlemen 1 as per the work that they perform, and then once that work is completed, that's when the maintenance 23 24 program begins.

MR. NEELY: Well, the maintenance

programs begins on the other two tanks immediately

because we have three storage vessels, and we're not

going to paint all three of them at the same time 3

because we don't want to take them out of service. 4

They're phased. And the cost for those have been 5

identified, and the structure is identified on that 6

payment schedule, and each one will be then 7

maintained as it goes along. 8

COUNCILMAN WENDELL: So we're going to 9

10 do Fern Road first --

MR. NEELY: And then Summerhill tanks. 11

COUNCILMAN WENDELL: -- and then 12 Summerhill Road somewhat immediately following?

13 MR. NEELY: Four years following.

14 COUNCILMAN WENDELL: Four years? 15

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MR. NEELY: Right.

COUNCILMAN WENDELL: So we're going to 17

pay the maintenance on that for 4 years.

MR. NEELY: Until then, right.

COUNCILMAN WENDELL: And then we're 20

going to pay them for the work that they do to 21

22 refurbish the tank at that point.

MR. NEELY: That's correct. 23

COUNCILMAN WENDELL: And then we're 24

going to continue our payments after that. 25

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MR. NEELY: Pay maintenance going forward. COUNCILMAN WENDELL: And then the Tices Lane tank? MR. NEELY: The Tices Land tank will be in 7 years. COUNCILMAN WENDELL: So I assume -correct me if I'm wrong -- that those payments on those tanks are a lot less than the payment that we'll be paying on the Fern Road tank after it's --MR. NEELY: No. The Fern Road tank is the smaller of the three tanks. It's one million 12 gallons. The Summerhill tank is a million and a half gallons, and the Tices Lane tank is a 10-million-gallon tank. They all have unique properties that we have to deal with when we paint them, and depending upon what the technology of the 17 time is, they have to be screened and protected so there's no overspray and there's no particles that 19 come off onto the side properties so that they have 20 to be netted. There are very complicated issues, 21 but all of those have been structured, and we could 22 not paint them all at once because you would choke 23

structure this so that our water rates do not see 1 2 rate shock over time because we have to maintain our system, and in doing so, we have been doing capital 3 improvements to the water lines. We're now going to 4 do capital improvements to the storage vessels and 5 6 try to maintain those stable water rates, and that's part of this structure is to maintain stable water 7 rates for the next 40 years without rate shock to 9 the customers.

COUNCILMAN WENDELL: Theoretically, I love it, and my only concern is what we paid now over the past 10 years for each tank and the past 20 years so we could see an analysis potentially of what we'd paid versus what we're going to be paying on an annual basis. I mean, I'm supportive of this, but I'd love to see those numbers if possible.

MR. NEELY: I'll see what I can develop for you. I don't know -- we haven't painted the tank in 10 years so -- and we built the Tices Lane tank, and with building it was - painting was part of it. So I'll see what I can do for numbers.

COUNCILMAN WENDELL: In all of this are we going to put our name on the tank?

MR. NEELY: No, you cannot put your name on the tank, and you can't scribe your name on any

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concrete at the bottom. We're all beyond 12 years of age.

on the water rate that I'd have to charge you to pay

for that and everybody else. We're trying to

COUNCILWOMAN CONTRINO: No, like the Township of East Brunswick.

COUNCILMAN WENDELL: Not my name in particular. I'm talking about the Township of East Brunswick.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: I have a few questions for you, Lou, and just to go back and the expertise that you have with the water utility and the water tank specifically. I mean, you've been through would it be conservative to say numerous repaintings and constructions of water tanks in East Brunswick. You have a vast knowledge of what we have.

MR. NEELY: Well, I've been here a long

time. 17

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COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: You've been 18 through many of them. My other question that's 19 technical in matter is let's take the Summerhill 20 tank, for example. If there's an issue where we're

seeing rust or we have to repaint it sooner than the

4 years that it's slated to be, does the payment 23 schedule move up? How do we work that? 24

MR. NEELY: We always have the -- if 25

the -- if there were something that would cause us 1

to feel that the tank is at risk because of 2

corrosion and rust before we fully restore it, that 3

could be moved up in those schedules so they could 4

be changed, but we have surveyed every tank. We've 5

looked inside it with robotic cameras. We have a 6

report of it. We've sampled the paint on the 7

exterior. We know what the particles are, the lead. 8

We know what the standards are for the millage that 9

has to be, and the Summerhill tank was the last tank 10

that we painted while I've been here, and we painted 11

that -- I forget the year right offhand, but I think 12

it's -- the schedule has been set based upon I think 13

some empirical evidence, not just economic evidence. 14

COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: Perfect. Any 15

further discussion? Councilwoman Clark.

COUNCILWOMAN CLARK: As long as we're 17 going down this path a little bit. 18

MR. NEELY: You're paying the 19

transcriber to transcribe everything, you know. 20

COUNCILWOMAN CLARK: Don't put that in

there. We have three tanks right now. 22

MR, NEELY: That's correct.

COUNCILWOMAN CLARK: With the 24

maintenance program and everything else. In terms

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of growing population, how long will those tanks serve the township?

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MR. NEELY: Well, I have spoken with the mayor, and I am going to be suggesting that there is need for a fourth tank west of the Turnpike for fire protection and for systemic protection for flow. We have just two lines that go under the Turnpike. If there were a major fire, I have said for the last 5 years that would be a major problem because we wouldn't have the water flow, and so I think it's time to also look at building that fourth tank. I've sent you communications on that, and I had planned this week to send all of that information out to you all again. It's an opportune question you have asked. So I will be sending you information.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: And if we were to go down that road, would we be able to put them into this contract, or they would stay - or that tank, itself, would stay separate out? MR. NEELY: No, we would like to bring

them into it, but you've got to bring them into in compliance with the local public contracts law. We can't just give them that opportunity, but it would be nice to deal with that, and we can then amend the

contract that happening, but there is a process that 1 we must all follow. 2

COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: Perfect. Any 3 4 further discussion? Mayor Stahl.

MAYOR STAHL: With respect to - I know 5 it's been characterized as a 40-year contract. The 6

thing that you also have to remember is one thing 7

that was important to myself in terms of the 8

negotiations with this contract is, you know, we 9

don't have any firsthand knowledge with respect to 10

Utility Services Group in East Brunswick. We've 11

12 done our due diligence. They do great work

everywhere else. But you always want the ability to 13

worry about what happens here in East Brunswick. 14

Under the contract, I believe it's 120 days notice 15

to get out of that contract at any one time. So if 16

17 they're not performing up to East Brunswick

standards, they're gone. Notwithstanding that, 18

obviously, they've got to comply with -- I don't 19

remember the exact alphabet -- water requirements 20

that are there, but theoretically or from a 21

philosophical viewpoint, what I would ask council to 22

view this as, this is a set maintenance plan by 23

which we know our tanks are going to be painted at a 24

certain schedule no greater than so many years after 25

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they're repainted the first time. The first time is 1 set already. We know exactly when each tank is 2

going to be painted within the next 7 years. 3

Thereafter, the maximum period I believe -- it's 4

been a while since I read the contract -- it was a

15-year period during which they must be repainted, 6

but if the studies show earlier, they're done 7

earlier. Even right now, a simple maintenance 8

issue, you know, you can drive by one of the water 9

tanks. There was some graffiti painted on it. 10

Won't be our responsibility anymore. They're going 11

to make sure that graffiti gets removed, and our 12

township employees, as one of the gentlemen said, 13

have better things to do than worry about graffiti 14

on a tank. Should their robotic inspections during 15

the course of a year indicate that there's problems, 16

you know, they're going to be responsible because 17

obviously it's in their best interest from an 18

economic standpoint to nip the problem in its bud 19

than let it go much later on. 20 Դ1

So I think this has been a very creative process that Louis put together, which from a

financial standpoint I think it works, and then from 23

just a maintenance schedule, it really takes the 24

decision making and leaves it up to the

professionals for inspecting on an almost yearly 1

basis. I think it's a win-win. 2

COUNCIL PRESIDENT HUGHES: Thank you. 3

Do we need to vote on this tonight? 4
